There are lots of things to celebrate and share from around the school this week.

They all enjoyed spending time inside a WW1 tank called Deborah and dressed up in full military uniform. They were shown how a replica training rifle worked and given a tour of all the tanks and armoured vehicles by the resident expert. They also experienced an Anderson shelter and talked about how it must have felt for people in London during the Blitz.
